ONTOLOGY OF PEACE: REFLECTIONS ON PLURIVERSALITY

Tentative date: 23rd and 24th June 2023

Pluriversality denotes the existence of several or plural ways of 'knowing' and 'being'. Ontologically, pluriversality underplays the authority of a particular knowledge system that may appear to claim universal validity. In other words, pluriversality allows scope for 'multiple ontologies or multiple worlds to be discovered or known'. And, not multiple perspectives on one world. This conceptualisation of pluriversality offers critical insights into peace-building. Some scholars have started to talk about a 'local turn' in the field of peace-building that spotlights the indispensability of local resources and agency for peace initiatives.

The proposed workshop, conceptualised as a multi-faceted gathering, is intended to initiate dialogues along these lines. The vision of the planned workshop is to turn the focus of various disciplines to draw implications for a pluriversal ontology of peace by moving beyond the confines of Eurocentrism. The associated aim is to reduce cultural bias in research and practice in peace psychology by including voices from regions and cultures that are typically not included in discourses on peace.

We welcome abstracts for our topics that include but are not limited to aesthetics of peace, politics in the Global South, evolution of conflict and resolution, religion and peacebuilding, social movements and political transformation, philosophy of peace, and peace education.

The abstracts should include:

- Key words (max 5)
- Abstracts: Max 500 words
- How the abstract/panel proposal fits the theme of the workshop (max. 200 words).

JIBS has recently been awarded a small workshop grant (runner up) by the International Society for Social Ontology for the project on 'Ontology of Peace', initiated by Associate Professor (Dr.) Neha Khetrapal in close coordination with the first year students of the Master's Program in Applied Psychology - Harsh Bhawnani, Riya, Chaitali Mishra and Janhavi Palandurkar. As a part of the grant, JIBS will be organising the first international workshop on peace psychology tentatively in June 2023.
