Biography

Menachem Hofnung is teaching at the Department of Political Science of the Hebrew University of Jerusalem. Professor Hofnung was a President of the Israeli Law and Society Association (2007-2010), Chair of the International Political Science Association Research Committee on Political Finance (2006-2009), President of the Association for Israel Studies (AIS) (2013-2015) and Chair of the Department of Political Science of the Hebrew University of Jerusalem (2015-17. Professor Hofnung has served as the Academic Director of the Joint Graduate Program in Public Policy and Law at the Hebrew University; Academic Director, The Gilo Center for Democracy and Civic Education. Menachem Hofnung served as member of the National Commission on Campaign Finance Reform (Levin Commission, 2000, and was a member of the National Commission on the Structure of Governmental Administration in Israel (Magidor Commission, 2006). Menachem Hofnung's research covers national security and civil liberties, constitutional politics and comparative political finance. Professor Hofnung has served in the Israeli Defense forces as a combat officer and retired from reserve duty at the rank of Major. Professor Hofnung also taught at the University of California at Berkeley and Irvine, San Francisco State University, the University of Florida at Gainesville, Moscow State University and was a Research Fellow at the Center for Law and Society at the University of California at Berkeley and Sydney University, Australia.

Course Description

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The course aims to provide students an introduction to the political system of Israel. The course touches upon the political history of the State of Israel, description and analysis of the state's authorities and powers and provides an overview of Israeli Society.

The course is organized into three parts. The first part establishes the historical and political background against which contemporary Israeli politics plays out. The second part deals with structure and powers of the state's branches of government. The third part of the course focuses on a number of crucial cleavages and debates within Israeli society – along political, religious, ethnic, and national lines. Although this course is not about the Arab-Israeli or Israeli-Palestinian conflicts, their influence on Israeli politics and society will be addressed.

Course Requirements

Our class time will be split between lectures and discussions. Students are expected to attend all classes having read the assigned readings and ready to participate in class discussions.

Please note: For each class, you will be assigned required readings and further suggested readings. Further readings will not be a part of the assessment but will help you understand the content better.

Assessment: 2500 word essay to be submitted via turn it in on by March 22, 2018
