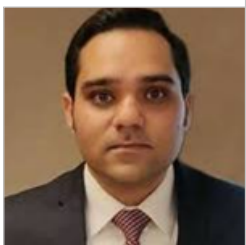
Prof. (Dr.) Dipika Jain is the Executive Dean and Professor of Law at Jindal Global Law School (JGLS), India, and is the chairperson of the School Doctoral Committee (SDC) of JGLS. Her scholarly interests encompass law and political economy, judicial politics, law and social movement, critical constitutionalism, feminist legal theory, queer theory, minor jurisprudence, reproductive justice, public health law and critical pedagogies. Her academic journey includes a B.A. in Political Science (Hons) from Lady Shri Ram College, an LL.B. from Delhi University and she received the Canadian Institute of Health Research Fellowship Award in Health Law & Policy, 2006 to pursue a Master's Degree at Dalhousie University, Canada. She earned an LL.M. from Harvard Law School (2009) and a Ph.D. in Law from the University of Frankfurt (2024). More about her work is available [here](#). In the Ph.D. programme, she teaches critical legal theory as part of research methodology courses.

Prof. (Dr.) B.S.Chimni is a Distinguished Professor of International Law at JGLS, and a member of its Academic Review Board (ARB). His areas of specialisation are International Legal Theory, International Economic Law and International Refugee Law. He worked for over three decades as a Professor of International Law, School of International Studies, Jawaharlal Nehru University. Among many achievements, in 2022 he was honored by the American Society of International Law with its Honorary Membership. The University of London has instituted a scholarship in his name for MA in Refugee Protection and Forced Migration Studies by Distance-Learning. He is a former Editor-in-Chief of the Indian Journal of International Law. In 2025, he was featured in the Stanford University / Elsevier World's top 2% scientists' list. Dr. Deblina Dey is an Associate Professor of Sociology and Assistant Director – Centre for Law and Humanities at JGLS. She pursues interdisciplinary research on care, law and inequality with a focus on older people in India. Her areas of specialisation include Sociology of Law in India, Critical Gerontology, Medical Anthropology (pharmaceuticalisation of care, medical harm, palliative/end-of-life care), Kinship Studies, custodial institutions, technology and contemporary social movements, and sociology of markets. Dr. Dey received her doctoral degree from the Centre for the Study of Law and Governance, Jawaharlal Nehru University, New Delhi. She is a recipient of the Fulbright-Nehru postdoctoral fellow and was based at DePaul University, Chicago, USA. Her ethnographic research highlights the experiences of marginalisation in late life and suggests ways to evolve better mechanisms to address elder abuse and abandonment. Prof. Gautam Bhatia is an Adjunct Professor of Law at JGLS. He is a prominent constitutional law scholar, advocate, and author. Known for his expertise in comparative constitutional law and digital privacy, he has written books such as State Surveillance and the Right to Privacy in India: A Constitutional Biography (2014), Offend, Shock, Or Disturb: Free Speech Under the Indian Constitution (2016), The Transformative Constitution (2019) and Unsealed Covers: A Decade of the Constitution, the Courts and the State (2023). In the Ph.D. programme, he teaches the course Comparative Constitutional Law and Theory.



Prof. (Dr.) Khagesh Gautam is a Professor of Law, Assistant Director with Center on Public Law & Jurisprudence and an Assistant Director with the Mooting and Advocacy Programme at JGLS. His areas of specialisation include constitutional law, comparative constitutional law, law of evidence, forensic evidence, and law of direct and indirect taxation. He received his LL.B. from Campus Law Centre in June, 2008 and his B.Com. from University College, Kurukshetra University in June, 2005. He was admitted to the Delhi Bar Council in July, 2008. Subsequently, he practiced before the Punjab & Haryana High Court at Chandigarh and several direct and indirect taxation tribunals in Haryana and Punjab in the years 2009-2012. He received his LL.M. from Columbia Law School in May, 2013 where he graduated as a Stone Scholar. Thereafter he was awarded a Ph.D. in law by Indian University. Prof. (Dr.) Mousumi Mukherjee is Professor & Deputy Director of the International Institute for Higher Education Research and Capacity Building (IIHED) at O.P. Jindal Global University. She is a distinguished Fulbright alumna with 20+ years of experience in the higher education sector of India, USA, and Australia. Prof. (Dr.) Prabhash Ranjan is a Professor and Vice Dean (Research) at JGLS. He is also the Director of the Centre for International Investment and Trade Laws at JGLS. His areas of expertise are in International Investment Law and International Trade Law. He holds a Ph.D. in law from King's College London, LL.M. from London at the School of Oriental and African Studies (SOAS) and University College London (UCL). He is a recipient of the prestigious British Chevening Scholarship for his LL.M. Prabhash sits on the editorial boards of reputed journals on international trade and investment law. Prof. (Dr.) Saloni Khanderia is a professor of law and Associate Dean (Research) at JGLS. She is a comparative private international law scholar whose work examines how domestic legal systems respond to the structural pressures of transnational commerce, regulatory pluralism, and global legal harmonisation, engaging European, Commonwealth, BRICS, and Asian jurisdictions. By mapping comparative approaches and identifying normative inconsistencies, her research offers principled frameworks capable of informing litigation strategy, judicial reasoning, and legislative reform. Prof. (Dr.) Sameena Dalwai is a Professor of Law at JGLS. She specialises in gender, sexuality, caste and law. She obtained her law degree from the University of Mumbai, LL.M. from the University of Warwick and Ph.D. from Keele University, U.K. Her doctoral research analyses the legal ban on dancing in the bars of Mumbai. In this work she focuses on sexuality and law during globalisation in India with a specific reference to caste capital of hereditary dancers. Dr. Saumya Saxena is an Associate Professor at JGLS. Her areas of specialisation include legal history, gender, family law, secularism, and politics in South Asia. She did her M.Phil (2012) and Ph.D. (2016) at the Faculty of History, University of Cambridge, and her Masters in Area Studies (2011) at the University of Oxford. Prof. (Dr.) Saumya Uma is a Professor of Law at JGLS and serves as Co-Director of its Ph.D. Programme. She is also a member of its Academic Review Board (ARB), and additionally serves as the Director of Centre for Women's Rights and Founding Faculty of Feminist Research Cluster at JGLS. Dr. Uma has over 31 years' work experience. She teaches, researches, writes and speaks at the intersections of gender, human rights and the law. She graduated from National Law School of India University (NLSIU) in 1994. She obtained her first LL.M. in Human Rights and Family Law from University of Mumbai in 1997, her second LL.M. in International Human Rights from the University of Nottingham, U.K. in 1999 and was awarded the Ph.D. in law by NLSIU for her thesis titled 'Victim and Witness Protection in Cases of Gender-based Violence.' Prof. (Dr.) S.G. Sreejith is a Professor of Law at JGLS, and Dean, Strategy and Institution-Building & Director of Endowment Development & Philanthropic Initiatives, Office of the Vice Chancellor, O.P. Jindal Global (Institution of Eminence Deemed to be University). He is the former Executive Dean of JGLS. He holds LL.D. (with high honours) from the University of Lapland, M.Phil. from Jawaharlal Nehru University, M.B.L. and LL.B. both from the University of Kerala. His areas of specialisation are public international law, heterodox approaches to international legal thought, and air and space law. Prof. (Dr.) Shankar Ramaswami is a Professor of Sociology, O. P. Jindal Global University. He works on the anthropologies of globalisation, migration, urban workers, and religion in South Asia. He completed an A.B. in Economics at Harvard College and an M.A. and Ph.D. in Sociocultural Anthropology at the University of Chicago. Prior to joining JGU, he was a Lecturer on South Asian Studies and Director of Undergraduate Studies in the Department of South Asian Studies at Harvard, where he taught courses on anthropology, literature, cinema, and religion. Sharmin Khodaiji is an Assistant Professor of Law at JGLS, and is in the process of completing her Ph.D. from the Centre for Political Studies, Jawaharlal Nehru University. Her research looks at the emergence of 'Indian Economics' as a specific field of study during the colonial period, by tracing the development of the discipline of political economy in Indian universities and the establishment of formal platforms such as journals and associations of economists in India. Dr. Vidya Subramanian is an Associate Professor at JGLS. She is an interdisciplinary scholar whose research interests lie at the intersections of technology, culture, and society, with a particular focus on the digital realm. Her doctoral research, completed at Jawaharlal Nehru University (JNU) New Delhi, analysed the impact of ICTs and television on cricket, focusing on how these technologies transformed the sport, the spectator, and the broader cultural landscape. Drawing on diverse academic fields such as Science, Technology, and Society (STS), Sociology, Media Studies, and Sports Studies, Dr. Subramanian's work critically interrogates how technological systems mediate social and political life. Prof. (Dr.) Upasana Mahanta is a professor at JGLS, and serves as the Dean of Admissions and Outreach at O.P. Jindal Global University.
