Over the last decade, JGU has grown into an institution that brings full-time faculty from 50+ countries in the world, students from 100+ countries and has collaborated with 575+ leading institutions in 80+ countries which makes the learning experience truly international.

JGU is ranked Number 1 in the world with the highest overall score amongst all universities and awarded 'Gold' by the Times Higher Education (THE) Online Learning Rankings 2024. JGU has been ranked as India's Number 1 Private University for three years in a row by the prestigious QS World University Rankings 2021-2023. JGU has been recognised among the Top 150 universities globally under the age of 50 years by the QS Young University Rankings. JGU has also been recognised in the Top 500 Universities as per the QS Graduate Employability Rankings 2022.

The Jindal Global Law School, has retained its number one rank in India for six consecutive years and remains the only Indian law school listed in the Global Top 100 by the QS World University Rankings by Subject 2025. Furthermore, JGU holds the distinction of being India's top private university for Arts & Humanities and Politics & International Studies (within the Top 201-250 globally). It ranks among the top two private universities in India for Economics & Econometrics, among the top three private universities in India (Top 274 in the world) for Social Sciences & Management, and among the top six private universities in India for Business & Management Studies (Top 500 in the world) as per the QS World University Rankings by Subject 2025. Welcome to the Jindal School of Liberal Arts and Humanities. What follows are some of my ideas about education based on thirty years of teaching.

At its origin, liberal arts referred to ideas attributed to Plato, the ancient Greek philosopher and adapted by the Romans in the second century CE. The naming of the seven liberal arts as the foundation of education was an effort to define what a citizen needed to vote and act in society. This collection of disciplines was known as artes liberales: "the knowledge worthy of a free person." The great learning initiatives established in South Asia, including Takshashila in the fifth century BCE and Nalanda (5th and 6th century CE), also serve as inspiring models. Going back to origins, while interesting, detracts from the central concern of educators and educational institutions across history and cultures, which is to provide direction for what should be emphasized and how learning will occur.

The mission of education has never been singular nor simple. As our awareness of the complexity of education becomes broader, we realize that there is no simple set of disciplines that will equip the student learner of all she needs to know to live "as a free person." Today the goal of education becomes one of increasing awareness of the way in which diverse points intersect during the learning process and how the ways of knowing determine what we chose to look at. Belief in an absolute truth was never possible in the sense that the simple truth does not exist. Being able to look at the world critically, understanding the origins of our beliefs and the information we receive is already a major achievement. Making sense of complex networks of information requires that we adopt an ethical framework, while at the same time practicing empathy for the views of others by trying to understand the context of the other's point of view.



Today misinformation proliferates, aided by AI and other forms of technology. Rapid reading of simplistic ideas often constructed solely based on key words, and aimed at a particular audience discourages any discussion and analysis of an issue. Recognizing the ambiguity of concepts becomes impossible. Walter Benjamin, a German-Jewish philosopher in Berlin in the 20th century, published an essay entitled The Storyteller in 1936, that discusses the writing of the Russian novelist Nikolai Leskov. Benjamin reflects on what is lost in the story where the student listening to the tale does not participate in the storyteller's journey. The story is shared by his listeners as it is to be passed along because the storyteller "allows the wick of his life to be consumed completely by the gentle flame of his story." The trajectory of the story allows for ambiguity, participation and an ever-expanding scope. Liberal arts education through collaborative experience and extending sites of learning beyond the classroom walls demonstrates that all education is at its foundation taking knowledge as one's own and transmitting the "story" that is constantly unfolding. In other words, new knowledge is constantly being created.

Through the Liberal Arts Curriculum, the student develops the skills to read, see, experience the world from multiple perspectives. Learning through the lens of the more familiar disciplines, such as history, literature, mathematics, sociology and philosophy will be enhanced by learning to use and appreciate other ways of knowing, including, the expressive arts, psychology, comparative religion, science and language. Understanding the power and limitations of technology as a tool is an invaluable skill you will draw upon. Combining multiple disciplinary perspectives is especially exciting as students can create multidisciplinary majors, such as, Economics and Visual arts, psychology and international business, Sociology-Anthropology and economics, Literature and history.

At JSLH, we know that learning does not take place in the restricted domain of the classroom alone. Students learn from field trips and research opportunities guided by your faculty. You will also learn to appreciate the value of seemingly banal experiences, like the organization of life in the hostels, the distinction of campus life from life outside the campus, the uniqueness and the similarity of all human experience and the way we humans interact with the environment. The possibilities are endless. If the richness of the plunge into liberal arts and humanities seems mind boggling; discussions with your mentors, teachers, seniors and fellow students will aid you in your journey.

JSLH strongly encourages students to study outside India. The possibilities for semester long and short-term study abroad now include eleven partner schools with more than 40% of students taking advantage of the opportunity. Students frequently refer to their international experience as "life changing." Whereas study abroad seems an obvious factor in gaining new perspectives, working within the community is an equally important part of the JSLH education. JSLH is committed to fulfilling the promise that students and faculty will see the importance of being active and engaged citizens. Taking your knowledge outside the classroom and the campus brings deeper meaning to the university experience. In your classes, through extra-curricular activities, internships and research, students begin to understand how we are all part of one world and how our actions have meaning. Students work alongside faculty, most of whom are contributing to social and planetary well-being through research, direct involvement in communities and collective action.

Learning does not occur in a single direction. I expect that all the faculty, staff and students will learn a great deal from one another. Students bring a fresh and unique perspective to the campus community, for which we are grateful.

Live every minute to its fullest. The years will pass all too quickly.

### Why Study Liberal Arts ど Humanities?

During the current historical period I cannot emphasize strongly enough the need to study liberal arts. There are two important reasons: first, you will become an engaged global citizen and, secondly, the world needs you. The broad range of classes, the diversity of subjects, the unique method of understanding critical issues, and insight into the process of creative problem solving provide the liberal arts graduate with those qualities that are among the most sought after by industry, governmental and nongovernmental organizations, and academia. The knowledge, skills and experience gained from the liberal arts are so relevant that they have been deemed indispensable by notable organizations worldwide.

For example, no sector of society, government or the economy can escape the reality of climate change. The liberal arts graduate can take a seemingly isolated event, such as unprecedented flooding in the Sundarbans mangrove region in the Bay of Bengal. This area was named a UNESCO World Heritage site because of the interdependence of animals, humans and vegetation on the mangrove forest, and the delicate balance maintained among these entities. JSLH faculty and JGU students are studying this environment from a variety of perspectives to understand the precarious balance that is under threat. The threat extends to loss of livelihood, loss of species, and disruption of the entire social network. These concerns may be applied to all regions of our planet. There is neither an easy nor a simple answer as to maintaining an equilibrium. However, by examining the situation through multiple lenses, we see the big picture that will make it possible to adapt to the situation and in the best instances, find ways to reduce the harmful effects of climate change. A liberal arts education makes it possible for individuals to know how to direct their observation and eventually apply their expertise to a variety of situations. The liberal arts graduate will value her ability to make creative choices and work as part of a team. For this reason, liberal arts graduates are among the most sought after in all fields of research and skilled jobs.



### Self-Designed Major

# Who Should Apply?

- If you are an explorer and want to engage in diverse social science and humanities subjects.
- If you are looking for experiential learning. We believe in learning by doing. Our classes emphasize on discussion, debate, and hands-on activities. Many of our overseas locations include fieldwork, while internships offer opportunities to have real world experiences.
- If you are passionate about more than one discipline, you can opt for a Self-Designed Major, which is designed by the student in consultation with two faculty directors of study. Some examples are Environment and Literature, Religion and Economics. The possibilities are limited only by your imagination and, of course, your serious plan of study.
- If you are curious about the way the world works and you wish to grasp the nuances of other cultures and ways of thinking, then you will find what you are looking for in a study abroad programme that is, as most students say "life-changing". The opportunities include short-term summer and winter sessions and semester-long exchange Programmes.



- If you want to learn other languages. Most of our students study a third language, since most are already bi-lingual. Spanish is required in the first year, but you can also take French, German, Mandarin, Arabic and Hebrew.
- If you want to let your imagination fly. Many courses in JSLH foster creativity such as those in the Expressive Arts or Design Thinking.
- If you want to become an entrepreneur or benefit by enhancing your entrepreneurial mindset. This could be as a social, political, creative, business, or any other entrepreneur.

- If you want an international degree, we offer a Dual Degree where students can pursue a four-year dual-degree programme with Rollins College, U.S. or Deakin University, Australia, in a chosen subject.
- If you don't like being "lost in the crowd", then JSLH is a right place for you. Classes are purposely kept small so that you get to know your teachers and fellow students. You will meet your faculty mentor regularly and your conversations can range from purely academic topics to quality-of-life issues and making future plans. The JGU campus has many student organizations, visiting artist performances, scholars and thinkers share their ideas so that you can find your niche easily.

### **Double Major**

A student opting for a double major can combine any of the two majors on offer within JSLH. Students opting for double majors must complete 12 advanced major courses of BOTH majors. In the credit structure this implies they need to use up all elective credits, plus take 3 additional electives



### **Economics Major**

The Economics major at JSLH aims to instill fundamental economic thinking in an interdisciplinary setup. Economics is traditionally understood as the 'science of humans as a relationship between ends and scarce means with alternative uses' (Lionel Robbins, 1932). In addition to internalizing these micro aspects of human behavior, students are also introduced to macroeconomics. The students are then trained in applying this dual perspective- micro and macroeconomics in various economic aspects, including political (Political Economy), developmental (Development Economics), and environmental (Environmental Economics), among many others. A crucial advantage of an Economics major is the training in numerous quantitative techniques, including Game Theory and Econometrics. These transferable tools can then be applied to approach various questions of local, national, or global significance.

Economics is a dynamic and fertile discipline that has borrowed significantly from psychology, sociology, law, political science, history, mathematics, and philosophy, allowing students to appreciate a genuinely interdisciplinary major. An Economics major, thus, enables a student to conceptualize, analyse and gain valuable critical insights into significant contemporary questions.

## Environment and Sustainable Development Major

The world needs people who are knowledgeable of the social, economic, geopolitical, and environmental considerations of issues ranging from climate change to ecosystem health to population growth and social responsibilities, and who can develop sustainable solutions to these issues. An Environment and Sustainability major from a liberal arts background is more advantageous because the interdisciplinary knowledge helps students to understand a problem from multiple perspectives which enables them to bring critical thinking and problem-solving skills to understand a particular situation. An E&SD major from a liberal arts perspective can combine this with psychology, international business, political science and international relations, economics, sociology and anthropology, visual arts to name a few. The E&SD major will help students develop concrete skills and analytical abilities, and gain hands-on experience relevant to careers in government agencies, non-governmental organizations, private industry, and academic fields. In the 21st century there is a need to effectively communicate environmental messages and take stewardship of setting up green start-ups, to be advocates of carbon credits, finding sustainable energy resources, fight climate change, and more importantly work towards ensuring our existence on the planet. An E&SD major will prepare you for all of this.

### Visual Arts Major

The major in visual arts is an interdisciplinary programme that integrates studio practice with study of art history and art theory. The programme offers a variety of courses ranging from drawing, painting, and sculpture to photography, video, sound, performance, and community art. The training in traditional and contemporary skills and the exposure to cutting-edge art, enable students to develop their distinctive approach to artmaking. The programme pays special attention to visual culture's role in our society and develops the students' ability to decipher and encode images. In addition to the curricular courses, the students participate in field trips to art galleries and museums and attend seminars and artist talks. During the programme's final year, students learn to conduct academic and artistic research.

# Literary Studies, Creative Writing and Publishing Major

The Literary Studies, Creative Writing and Publishing major at JSLH undertakes the cultural exploration and scholarly study of varied kinds of texts, literary and often otherwise, including, but not limited to those written in English. In our efforts to do so, we often cross the boundaries of time, language and genre, keeping in mind the complex routes of cross-cultural exchanges and fertilization that lie at the basis of all literary and artistic endeavours. To that end, the major aims to impart the important skills of critical reading and thinking, analysis, synthesis and creativity, critique, and reflective writing on, and sometimes of, literature — as form, text, edition and publication, hyper-text or another category. Keeping in mind an interdisciplinary focus, the students in Literary Studies major are also often encouraged to explore literature vis-à-vis the other arts and media, interrogating in the process conjunction of literary and cultural texts with socio-economic history, political movements, ideologies and other intellectual developments. In other words, along with the more "traditional" and "canonical" literary texts, students in the programme are also trained to read and analyse "non-literary" and/or "non-traditional" forms such as film and new media, through the lens of different schools of literary criticism and theory.



### Political Science and International Relations Major

The Political Science and International Relations major introduces a comprehensive view of the two disciplines in equal measure. An inter-disciplinary approach is used to build on the starts we have made with the foundation course in political science and IR. We critically examine, in greater depth, the concepts and theories on the evolution of the State; the development of notions of freedom, justice, sovereignty, individual and human rights, and citizenship; the complex mechanism of government formation and functioning including electoral processes; constitutional imperatives; division of power within branches of governments; the influence of various kinds of interest groups and political movements that underscore limitations of prevailing governments and effect either a contestation of the State or a change in its character. While we maintain a good focus on the independent Indian state as our object of study in some courses, others focus on political frameworks and their functioning in major geo-political players in the contemporary world. The major aims to understand contemporary politics in relation to wider and larger cross-currents when it comes to inter-state interactions in the International Relations courses in order to strike a balance between theories of political science and international relations and the realities of the contemporary world. Although the larger focus is on studying the State, many other ideas that emanate from it are also investigated in both political science and international relations, viz. institutions, feminism, international settlements, diplomacy, governance, globalisation.

KEY TAKEAWAYS: The Political Science and International Relations major will engage with and enhance student critical thinking capacity and command over national and global political issues. It will help equip students with a toolbox to work with the nuts and bolts of politics. It will do all this while examining social and political reality with a diversity of theoretical lenses and hopefully empower the student to undertake complex intellectual tasks in the future.

### **Psychology Major**

Psychology is the scientific study of mind and behavior based on robust research methods. The psychology major in the School of Liberal Arts and Humanities at 0.P. Jindal Global University (JGU) is designed to provide you with the knowledge, skills and awareness required to apply psychological principles to the world around you. While retaining the essence of a scientist practitioner model which emphasizes theoretical knowledge and practical skills, the psychology major embedded within the B.A [LH] programme amalgamates this traditional approach with interdisciplinarity. It is geared towards training students to conceptualize complex world phenomena through a psychological lens rooted in a multidisciplinary perspective. This approach draws upon knowledge, perspectives and methods drawn from the arts and sciences. Creating course content that examines the intersection between psychology and other disciplines provides scope for divergent disciplinary perspectives that foster essential graduate attributes of critical thinking for problem solving as well as generate curiosity for lifelong learning in an ever-changing world. Combining an experiential pedagogy that places emphasis on self-reflection and analysis, we we equip our students to pursue graduate studies in psychology as well as branch out to explore the interconnections within psychology and related disciplines, whether it be through professional commitments, research or academic pursuits.

### Sociology and Anthropology Major

Societies tell stories about themselves. These stories take varied shapes in sustaining a range of social structures and institutions. Sociology and anthropology are disciplinary methods which offer wavs with which to uncover these stories and their working in a society. These methods could be applied to 'traditional' topics such as family, kinship, religion, as well as to those of markets, political institutions, bureaucracies, military, corporations, NGOs and so on. They are crucially geared towards difference in the making of the modern world - why do people from different societies have different reactions to the same things (e.g. Mcdonalds burgers)? These disciplines introduce concepts like time, space, structure, agency, and representation and emphasise the variations in how different societies understand these concepts. Anthropology and sociology are both theoretical as well as empirical disciplines, and they provide us with a knowledge of the many social patterns and alternatives that exist in the world, and a variety of theoretical lenses which can be used to study how people actually live in different social and cultural settings. They also help us develop an understanding of how societies have developed historically along with an awareness of contemporary social issues. They have an applied side to them too, where sociological and anthropological concepts can be used to address wider issues and problems in societies and to develop relevant responses and policies. As a student taking the Society, Space, and Culture and Anthropology Major, you will build on concepts and paradigms introduced in your foundation courses like Sociology and the Interdisciplinary Seminars to develop an in-depth understanding of society, its institutions, structures, and a range of current issues that arise from social life.

### Cultural and Creative Economies (CCE)

This major will prepare professionals who can plan, sustain and develop strategies to effectively address the contemporary challenges of marketing art and culture in a fast-changing global economy. It will deliver comprehensive knowledge of the social, economic and legal landscape of culture, the modes of governance, infrastructure, and ideas of identity & labor within cultural and creative industries. It is grounded in interdisciplinary methods of critical enquiry to explore the historical as well as emergent modes of production, distribution and audience engagement to prepare students to work in the complex globalized cultural sectors.

The major offers flexibility to students to focus on a particular cultural sector to develop a capstone project in which students are expected to synthesise and apply the core concepts acquired from the programme. Possible areas of concentration include theatre and performance, visual arts, dance, music, tourism, heritage, design, gaming and food. Through simulations, guided experiences, field trips and case studies-based research, students will hone the skills required to work in multi-dimensional arts environments. Outcome-based workshops by scholars, art practitioners, programmers and industry experts will enable understanding best practices, allow students to conceptualize and strategically execute cultural events and plan marketing, promotion and fundraising campaigns. Students will gain practical experience relevant to working in their chosen creative sector by undertaking short term internships in arts organisations, festivals, galleries, cultural centres, production houses, theatre/dance companies, etc.

### What will the students learn

To curate, plan and execute novel projects and programmes/art festivals/cultural events that require sensitised organisational efforts, strategic marketing and fund raising.

To conceptualise expansion and growth of cultural organisations towards financially viable practices that have a wide audience reach

To assess risks and opportunities for collaboration and community building in the creative sector.

To communicate effectively and with sensitivity to cultural or other relevant contextual factors within the global creative sector.

To better pitch and advocate necessary artist causes at the community, state and international platforms.

To conceptualise programmes that employ art in order to catalyse and support positive social change.

Digital Humanities is a new field that brings together the arts, humanities, and technology. The DH major at JSLH will help students to become sensitive, critical, and reflective readers and users of digital tools and spaces by understanding their embeddedness in political, social, and economic contexts. Technologies such as digital mapping, quantitative textual analysis, spatial storytelling and social media analysis will equip students to understand and study the arts as well as humanities disciplines through digital computational tools. DH is interdisciplinary in its foundation, and the courses in this JSLH major are taught by faculty across the social science disciplines— environmental studies, economics, history, literary studies, sociology, and art.

## The Self-Designed Major

The self-designed major is one of the most unique and often compelling option for students at JSLH. The major allows you to customize your course mix and align it with the nuanced interests you may have in your studies and the role you want to play in the world after graduating. The self-designed major has been created to accommodate students who have a strong interest in a concentration that does not exist in the standard curriculum of JSLH. The concentration may be a unique interdisciplinary concentration or a recognized major that crosses several schools. It normally involves a combination of courses from two majors and occasionally from more than two. Students will be required to write a statement of purpose as to how the self-designed major they are proposing is aligned with their future goals along with the list of courses that they propose to take. Students who are eligible and opt for the Research track in their 4th year will need to have a thesis topic that is aligned with their self-designed major and will hence work under the active supervision of two faculty, one each from the two majors. The breadth of the self-designed major must not compromise the depth and rigor of a given domain. A thorough understanding of the methodology, theoretical basis and application of each discipline must be understood along with the synergies of the integrated fields. While not a wide-spread option in India, self-designed and interdisciplinary majors are increasingly common in the United States, Canada, and the United Kingdom. All major liberal arts colleges in the United States offer this option to their students.



# Students' Research at JSLH

The BALH programme at JSLH required students to submit an undergraduate thesis in their final (third) year. With the adoption of the four year programme, a student will now have the option of choosing a 'research track' in the fourth year, after meeting certain grade criteria. This provides them with an opportunity to acquire knowledge of research methods and enhance their research skills through an undergraduate research thesis. A student would identify a topic of interest which is generally expected to be aligned with their major choices. The thesis needs to be under the supervision of a faculty member to enable deeper and structured exploration of the topic. Given an increasing emphasis on undergraduate research, a rigorous thesis will prepare the students for future academic or other career pursuits, in India and overseas. JSLH has pioneered a unique initiative to romote undergraduate research in India resulting in an annual research conference at the JGU campus. The eighth edition of the Undergraduate Research Conference was organized on April 4-5, 2025, centered around the theme "Artificial Intelligence, Interdisciplinarity, and the Future of Liberal Arts.". The conference created intellectually vibrant space undergraduate researchers to present original work on some of the most urgent questions of our time. With over 90 student researchers and 16 thematic panels, the conference featured













projects exploring Al's impact on governance, labour, health, gender, the environment, education, and creative practice. The two day conference opened with a keynote by renowned historian and curator Rahaab Allana, who reflected on visual archives, digital culture, and the ethical challenges of representation in an Al-driven world. It concluded with a powerful address by publisher Chiki Sarkar, who discussed authorship, storytelling, and the evolving relationship between creativity and technology. An Educators Panel brought together voices from academia, diplomacy, publishing, and the arts to explore the pedagogical and ethical implications of artificial intelligence in the interdisciplinary higher education. Student panels ranged widely- from investigating AI in electoral processes, reproductive health, and mental health, to analysing memory, surveillance, cinema, sustainability, and virtual realities. The BFA Open Studio and Poster Presentation reimagined research as artistic expression, inviting audiences to engage with inquiry through visual and sensory narratives that transcend the written word. The launch of the URC 2024 Proceedings and recognition of last year's best papers reinforced a culture of research that is both reflective and forward-looking. URC'25 reflects JSLH's commitment to fostering critical thinking, ethical research, and collaborative learning. We hope this glimpse into the conference inspires you to imagine the kinds of questions you might one day bring into such a space.
