With ambitious targets of net-zero by 2070, 500 GW of non-fossil capacity by 2030, and schemes like the PM Surya Ghar Muft Bijli Yojana. India is emerging as a global innovator in clean energy and resilience. Yet, continued coal dependence, financing challenges, and ensuring a just transition highlight the complexity of the journey ahead. These choices will shape India's energy landscape and its leadership in sustainable development.

By 2036, India's cities will house nearly 600 million people and drive over 70% of GDP, yet face fragile infrastructure, weak finances, and rising climate risks. Flagship schemes like Smart Cities and Swachh Bharat have made progress, but most urban bodies remain dependent and underpowered. Citizen-led innovations show promise, but the key challenge is rewiring urban governance to make cities resilient, inclusive, and globally competitive.

- How can citizen participation and civic innovation be scaled without compromising accountability?

India's "aspirational majority", a middle class set to comprise two-thirds of the population by 2030, is driving demand for housing, healthcare, education, and digital services while reshaping politics and governance. Yet, limited jobs, inequality, weak social security, and urban pressures threaten these aspirations. Empowering this group as both producers and consumers is vital for growth, but inclusivity and sustainability remain the core challenge.

- Can the aspirational majority become the stabilising anchor of democracy and a driver of modernisation?

Beyond Doctrine: Whole of Government approach as the future of Indian warfighting

The panel will deliberate on five broad pillars central to India's evolving defence posture. First, the challenges of capability development and indigenisation, particularly in acquiring and absorbing emerging and disruptive technologies. Second, the need to restructure India's defence framework to meet contemporary security demands. Third, the ongoing debate on theaterisation and the imperative of intra-military jointness. Fourth, the conduct of both conventional and sub-conventional operations in a rapidly shifting operational environment. Finally, the discussion will draw upon lessons from Operation Sindoor to illuminate these aspects in practice.

Healthcare Revolution: India's Path to Universal Healthcare Access

Healthcare underpins human development, yet India faces persistent gaps in access, affordability, and quality. The pandemic revealed both resilience, through pharma strength and digital health, and vulnerabilities in underfunded primary care, weak infrastructure, and high out-of-pocket costs. Initiatives like Ayushman Bharat and the Digital Health Mission mark progress, but achieving Universal Health Coverage (UHC) needs higher public investment, workforce reforms, and a stronger focus on preventive, community-based care.

- What financing and workforce reforms are essential to achieve UHC?
- How can technology, partnerships, and preventive care be leveraged to ensure equity and access for all?
